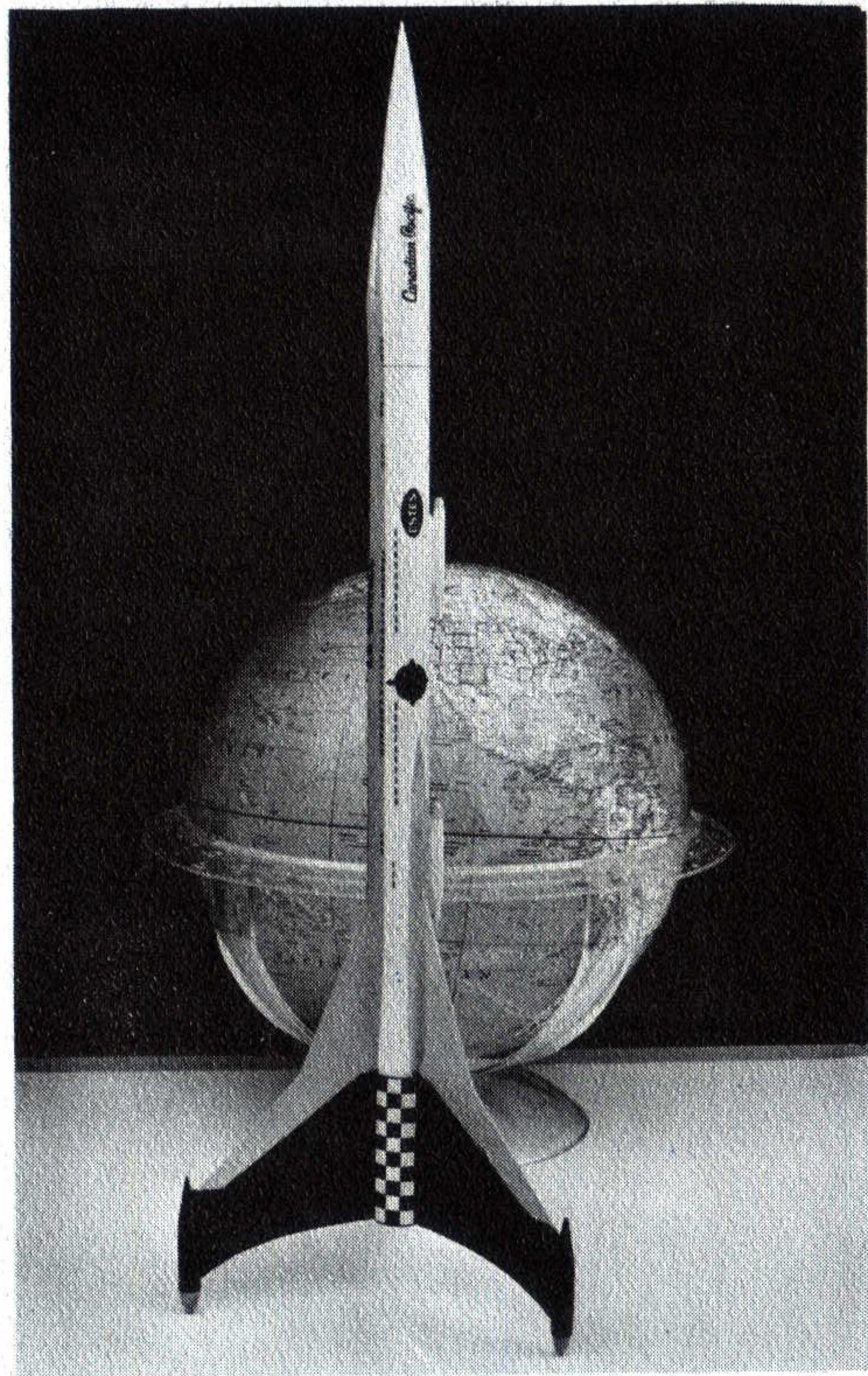


BALLAD OF ESTES INDUSTRIES
