## TIME OUT!

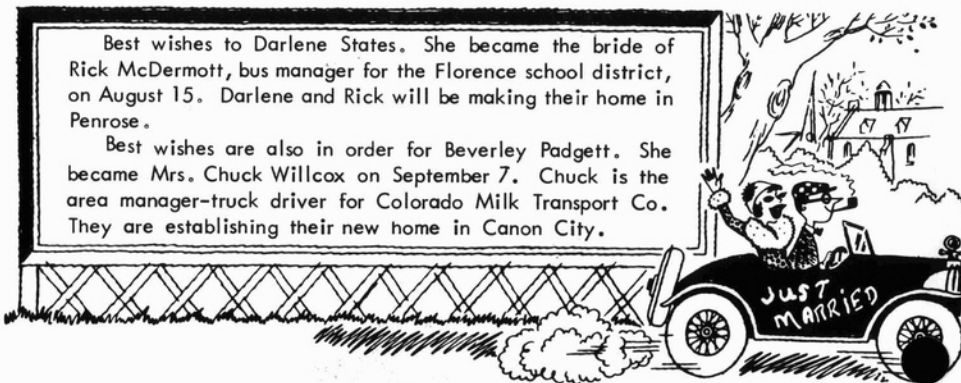
"Through the courtesy of your company, the Central County TB and Respiratory Disease Association will offer a testing program to guard your health.

Sudden growth has been the rule in the Print Shop the last few months observes Jean Curnutte, department supervisor. A year ago the major equipment in the Print Shop consisted of one large offset duplicator, a smaller press, an exposure cabinet, a paper cutter, a folder and a manual collator. The fascinating tandem press, another A.B. Dick offset press with a T-51 color head, a second exposure cabinet, an intriguing collator and two more folders have since taken their places with the original equipment. In July the operational period of the de-

partment was expanded to a sixteen hour day. Darlene Snyder became supervisor of the day shift, and a full evening crew was added. With this increase in equipment and personnel the Print Shop is now capable of printing 400,000 impressions a day.

When a publication, whether it be the Model Rocket News, design booklet, rocket instructions, technical report or the Launch Pad, has been written, typed, illustrated, pasted up and photographed the negative is brought into the Print Shop.

A press operator masks the negatives, burns them on a plate in the exposure cabinet and develops the image on the plate with a special fluid.

As the press is put into operation the image on the plate is transferred to a blanket, then from the blanket to the paper. This process is called offset printing. After the desired number of copies have been printed the plate may be removed, stored and used again whenever needed.



The tandem press is, as its name implies, two presses, end-to-end, functioning as one. It is capable of printing one side of a full 11" by 17" sheet of paper, flipping it, then reprinting the other side -- all in one continuous operation. It and the press with the T-51 color head can print two colors at once. Six press operators keep a steady flow of material coming off the presses to serve us

and our customers. Besides Jean and Darlene, Nettie McCracken, Coy Thomason, Dora Jane Burgess and Wayne Rayburn are engaged in keeping those presses "humming".

Collating material is another vital function of the Print Shop. If a publication consists of more than one sheet of material, the sheets must be put together, in order, to form the desired booklet. By hand, one sheet at a time, this task can be enormous. The small collator, under the watchful eye of Connie Miller, speeds this job considerably.

Following the collating process the material is folded and stapled. The folding machines can be set to half fold, flat fold or triple fold. Jerry Vale and Nona Conran spend most of their working time coaxing the folders into performing properly.

The large collator, a piece of equipment purchased recently, combines the steps of collating, folding and stapling into one fully automatic operation. This machine can spit out completed Design Booklets at the rate of over 400 an hour.

Other tasks of the Print Shop crew are paper cutting, pad making, booklet binding and packet assembling. Marlene

Lewis is in charge of binding sets of technical reports, copies of the M.R.N.'s and literature for school libraries. She also assembles packets for educators, dealers and rocket clubs.

The printed word is a powerful force in our society today. Many of these powerful printed words are published in the Estes Print Shop.
