



# UP UP AND AWAY



The rocket rested quitely on the launch pad as a cluster of expectant people waited for the countdown to begin.

''5 . . . 4 . . . 3 . . . 2 . . . 1 . . . LIFT OFF!''

The rocket left the pad, rose swiftly into the clear blue sky, then gently returned to earth by parachute.

Was the successful launch the work of hobby enthusiasts? No, it was accomplished by Estes employees as they discovered more about their company and the space age hobby of rocketry.

Every employee at Estes is entitled to free rocket kits to build and fly. Obtained from the shift supervisor, the kits aid in understanding the company and the customer. The first training kit in the series contains a simple rocket, glue, sanding sealer, paint, paint brush, thinner, sandpaper, knife and design book. Once the rocket is completed, the Department Supervisor watches the launching and signs the request for another kit.

As the employee increases his understanding of rocketry, the models become more complex. The first kit can be the Alpha or the Wac Corporal. The other kits are the Scout, Apogee, Farside, Space Plane, Falcon and Cobra. Each one must be built by the employee with no outside help, and flown before the next kit may be attempted.

The Cobra is the last of the specified training kits. The employee may then build any of the more advanced rockets that he wishes to, including the Saturn series.

After a rocket has been built and flown, it remains the property of the employee to provide him many more hours of enjoyment. During the summer months, the rockets are given many practical uses in contests between employees.

If you haven't yet joined in on the fun of building and flying your own model rockets, start today by getting your starter kit from your supervisor. If any of the shift supervisors are not aware of this program, full information can be obtained by contacting the Personnel Department.




#### BESSIE FERKEL

## EMPLOYEE BENEFITS

Among the many company benefits for Estes employees are paid insurance premiums which cover Unemployment Compensation and Workmens Compensation at the rate of \$14.52 a month, and the Hartford Hospitalization insurance premium of \$9.00 a month. Estes pays a total of \$174.18 for each employee, each year.

Each employee's personal coverage for Unemployment and Workmens Compensation begins immediately. The Hartford coverage does not go into effect until a three month probationary period has been completed. After that date the employee is automatically covered.

Estes employees are also able to take advantage of a group hospitalization insurance plan for their dependents. This additional insurance costs only \$7.91 per paycheck, regardless of the number of dependents covered.

We hope you never need to use the benefits of this coverage, but if you do, it's there to help you and your family.
