
PLEASE HELP

THE GRADUATES OF 1970



To qualify for holiday pay, an employee must be a full-time, inplant worker who has been employed for at least 90 consecutive days before the holiday. In addition he must work a full shift on his last scheduled workday preceeding the holiday and on his first scheduled workday following the holiday. During the Memorial holiday, each eligible employee will receive pay for the equivalent of a full eight hours of work.

A resident of Canon City, Carolyn Simonson is waiting for her husband's return from Viet Nam. Horseback riding, bowling and reading are her favorite activities.


VOICES FROM THE PAST

She in turn had been stubborn and difficult. However, she had about decided to settle down in the pleasant surroundings of the machine shop to produce engines for our customers.

NEW TELEPHONE SYSTEM INSTALLED

Have you been hearing a strange buzzing sound in your ears recently when you start to dial a number? Don't worry, there is nothing wrong with you. The new sound is part of the telephone System TE-400 that was recently installed throughout the plant. As soon as all offices have been permanently located and the correct numbers installed, this system will be more rapid and practical for the telephone operator and all other plant employees to use than the old one.


One of the advantages provided by the space-age phone system is that anyone can transfer a call without first calling the operator. Consultation calls with a third party and special conferences can also be set up without any inconvenience. Night calls can be received by any phone in the plant if necessary. However, these calls will normally be answered by the Shipping Department and transferred.

Developed by International Telephone and Telegraph, the electronic equipment was first used in a Denver bank on an experimental basis. Estes Industries is only the second company in Colorado to use this advanced new system TE-400.




